Saturday's race hot, challenging and fun

The Amelia Island Sailing Club held its seventh sailboat race of the season on Saturday. The weather forecast was correct, with virtually no wind in the morning, a light wind from east at midday of 6 mph, building relatively quickly to a nice breeze of 12-15 mph with some higher gusts over the next couple of hours.

It was hot, sunny and the tide turned outgoing just before the start of the race at noon in the middle of Cumberland Sound.

The seven racing sailboats all had a good start into the wind, with some on starboard tack heading toward Cumberland Island and several on port tack heading toward Amelia Island.

It took several long tacks across the St. Marys River in the light air to reach the first mark near the jetties east of Fort Clinch. The beginning of the ebb tide had little effect at this point in the race, but the faster sailboats quickly built a lead over the slower boats.


Getting ahead of the steadily increasing outgoing current was an important factor in the end results of the race. The two long legs from the vicinity of Fort Clinch to the marks at the western end of the sound were directly downwind, with all sails set wing-on-wing (mainsail on one side of the boat, the genoa set on the other side) to maximize sail area to capture the wind from direct astern. The wind was increasing, which helped, but so was the outgoing current, which did not.

The 9.7-nautical mile race was a long and hot race because of the cloudless, sunny sky, temperature in the high 80s, lighter winds and strong currents. The first boat crossed the finish line a little after 2:32 p.m., more than two and a half hours after the start. The last boat did not finish until an hour later. Regardless, it was a beautiful day to be on the

First place was taken by Bill Kavanaugh on Tiger Tale, with success highly attributed by Kavanaugh to his very capable crew, including Justin Whatley and Hardee Kavanaugh, sail trimmers, and Anne

Kavanaugh as navigator.
Almost seven minutes
later, second place was
secured by Wilby Whitt's
Misty, with Fred Eichmann
at the helm. About a minute later, Graeme Nichol's
Fin placed third, followed
very closely 38 seconds later
in fourth place by Justin
