Sailing club holds Ice Bucket Challenge

The Amelia Island Sailing around the windward mark, Club held its first race of the 2024 racing season on Saturday, Jan. 20. It was a gorgeous sailing day. The mid-40s cold temperature and variable northwest winds of 10-15 knots under clear sunny skies was suitable for this annual race, the Ice Bucket Challenge. The club's perpetual "Ice Bucket" trophy has been awarded to the winner of this race since 1985.

Seven sailboats with 24 bundled-up sailors competed for the trophy on the sixnautical mile course, with the start time of 1 p.m. The race committee boat, under the command of Russ Ridley and his crew, monitored one of the closest starts in recent memory and then motored alongside the fleet to provide many great pictures.

Six boats on port tack raced for the pin end of the start line, with one boat, Lola, racing along the line on her right-of-way starboard tack, hoping to block the port-tackers, but she was just a little late to stop the first boats from starting.

All boats remained close heading towards Cumberland Island after the start before a required tack to the west for the long windward leg to the first mark. Sailing with the current into freshening winds, the naturally faster sailboats separated from the slower boats

which was not far from the shallows off the west end of Cumberland Island. Unfortunately, Valkyrie suffered a soft grounding and had to retire from the race after being assisted by the race committee boat. Fortunately, there was no damage or injuries, just bruised egos.

Favorable winds helped with the downwind legs into the current, and all boats finished the race without further incident. Bill Kavanaugh's "Tiger Tale" took line honors for being the first boat to finish with an elapsed time of one hour and nine minutes, followed very closely just two minutes later by Wilby Whitt's Misty, with Fred Eichmann at the helm. The next two boats also finished closely together with Garv Sanders on Salty Sally finishing 12 minutes later and beating Jos Wolke on Lola by just one minute. Norm Wentworth and crew on Morning Glory finished next, followed by Jason and Colleen Gerke on Juliana.

After applying PHRF Racing handicaps, the corrected finish order was Misty winning the race, then Tiger Tale, "Salty Sally, Lola, Morning Glory and Juliana.

Hearty congratulations to Misty for winning the 2024 Ice Bucket Challenge. She was raced hard and fast by her owner, Whitt, helmsman Eichmann and crew mem-



Anthony Kim in talks with PGA Tour, LIV Matthieu Pavon won the Farmers about return

Anthony Kim, who blazed a red-hot trail on the PGA Tour for four seasons and then disappeared from public view after injuries derailed his career nearly a dozen years ago, has been in discussions with the PGA Tour and the LIV Golf League about returning to professional golf. Kim. 38. made his last start on the PGA Tour when he withdrew after the first round of the Wells Fargo Championship in May 2012. He underwent surgery to repair an Achilles tendon injury in his left leg the next month. He hasn't played in a professional tournament since. Kim is eyeing a potential return to pro tournaments sometime this spring. A sticking point in his comeback is that he collected at least part of a disability insurance policy that was reportedly worth \$10 million to \$20 million. He would probably be required to pay back a large portion, if not all, of the settlement he has collected.

Lessons from the Golf Pro

Most of us experience some form of joint stiffness or loss of flexibility when we hit too many balls. Here are some suggestions in order to maintain flexibility and keep your muscles in use. Regardless of your age, participating consistently in a golf-specific exercise program can greatly improve your game. A golf-specific conditioning program consists of resistance training, cardiovascular conditioning, and functional flexibility. Walking, biking, stair-stepping, and running are examples of cardiovascular exercise. For flexibility, try reaching your hands to the ceiling and stretching to your sides a couple of times each day. Tilting your head and neck back and forth and side-to-side are also very
