What is heeling? Heeling is the boat "tipping" to one side or the other; it is caused primarily by the force of the wind on the sails; although it can be caused by weight such as crew or excess cargo. Some heeling in inherent in sailing; as the force of the wind is transferred into forward motion, any excess is transferred into sideways motion – some of which is slippage and some of which is heeling.

Unbalanced helm is a byproduct of excess heel. The design of the sails and the hull of the boat combine to cause the boat to "head up" into the wind. As more force causes more heel, the boat "pulls" as it tries to head up, causing a difficult helm called weather helm.

When a boat is heeled, the center of effort changes. The center of effort is the pivot point of the sails and is related to the center of lateral resistance, which is below the waterline. One way to reduce heeling is to move the center of lateral resistance upwards Crew weight can be a factor on a small or light boat. If the helmsman and/or the crew shifts their weight to what is known as the "HIGH" side of the boat, their body weight will overcome some percentage of the heel ... Sail trim is the primary cause of heeling; the most common way to reduce heeling is to reduce the amount of wind in the sails. There are several ways to accomplish this 1) "Spill" the wind by easing the sails 2) Come up into the wind, thereby putting less wind in the sails 3) Flatten the sails which reduces the fore of the wind ... and reefing the sails when overpowered.

In a nutshell: Sailing with a strong heeling angle gives sailors the distinct impression of good speed - not true! **Excessive heeling slows you down**.

AISC CLUB RACING NORM WENTWORTH



There are great sailing days, good days, and interesting days, but never any bad sailing days. Saturday, March 18 was an "interesting day" for the third race of Amelia Island Sailing Club's (AISC) 2023 season. A very strong outgoing tide for the duration of the 9.3 nautical mile race, overcast with periods of drizzle and downpours, and a wind that would not make up its mind how hard to blow or from which direction all combined to test the skills and mettle of the five teams that raced. Two other boats had planned to race but refrained due to the weather.

The first close reaching leg to the first mark south of Cumberland Island gave all the boats a navigational challenge and a hint as to what was to come. The outgoing current pushed out to sea and no boats were able to round the mark without several tacks to claw back up-current before finally rounding the mark. This routine of missing marks due to the current continued for every windward and reaching leg of the triangular course. The fast down-current and downwind legs from the west end of Cumberland Island into the Amelia River provided the only respite from upwind slogs.

Line honors for the fastest boat was taken by the team on Wilby Whitt's "Misty" with Fred Eichmann at the helm in 2 hours 33 minutes. All the remaining boats finished within the next 30 minutes. After applying the race handicaps, "Misty" held onto first place and newcomer "McGeeves" finished eight minutes behind in second place after having been sailed masterfully by Steve Boice and crew. The last three places were captured by "Morning Glory" skippered by Norm Wentworth, Jos Wolke on "Lola", and Graeme Nichol on "Fin". It was certainly an interesting race as Wilby commented in reflection: "I have never missed so many marks in a season, let alone in one day." The next AISC race is on Saturday, April 22 and the annual Coastal Cup race from Amelia Island to St. Simons Island is on Saturday, May 13. Boats planning to race in the Coastal Cup are advised to make their reservation at Morningstar Marina as soon as possible. All Club members with sailboats or those interested in crewing are invited to race with us, or watch the race from the race committee boat. If you have friends with a sailboat, encourage them to join our Club - \$100

membership gives them a year of monthly races, as well as our meetings and other club activities. Watch for the AISC race notice email sent two weeks before each race and plan to have some fun.
