# Watch it on Netflix! UNTOLD THE RACE OF THE CENTURY

A chronicle of the thrilling 1983 America's Cup, "The Race of the Century" is a classic underdog story.

It tells the tale of the scrappy group of Australians who band together to dethrone the New York Yacht Club,

and break the longest-running win streak in history— 132 years!— in the most prestigious sailing competition in the world.

Key members of the 1983 U.S. and Australian crews sit down for interviews sharing their experience of this ultimate race to victory.

Lots of awesome race scenes, details and amazing background shots about the classic America's cup racing with 12-meter sailboats.

Australia II (KA 6) is the 12 Metre challenge boat sailed by John Bertrand to win the 1983 America's Cup. She was the first successful challenger and broke a 132 year string of successful defenses by the New York Yacht Club. Designed by Ben Lexcen, built by Steve Ward, owned by Alan Bond and helmed by John Bertrand. Lexcen's Australia II design featured a winged keel which gave the boat a significant advantage in sailing faster and pointing higher into the wind.

#### REAR COMMODORE GARY SANDERS



I am slowly making progress on the membership database, trying to make it more useful for all of us. While I have the data organized, I thought it would be a good time to share some membership statistics. The following figures are the number of "memberships", which, for the most part, include two people. The club currently has 59 memberships (~118 members) who have paid their 2023 dues. We have an additional 15 memberships that have yet to renew as of Feb 28<sup>th</sup>. Their status will show in the database as "Lapsed". They will continue to have access to the website and will receive emails for a few more months, including reminders about their payments. At any time, they can pay their invoice online which will immediately change their status to "Active". We do have some members that will notify us of their intention not to renew for various reasons. At that time, we "suspend" their membership, but keep their contact details archived for future communications.

Last year, we added 13 new memberships (26 members) compared to only 5 memberships that did not renew.

We have already added 6 new memberships in 2023.

The makeup of the club is constantly changing as we add new members and lose others. Here is the approximate distribution based on years of membership.

#### Years of Membership: Percent of Club

One or less: 24%
Two to Three: 17%
Four to Five: 27%
Over Five: 32%

This high turnover rate creates a need to have a better way to get to know each other. One of my objectives is to develop a program for members to share a brief bio about themselves. One suggestion is to include this bio in the Scuttlebutt. Maybe one new member and one long-term member each month. Any other ideas are welcomed.

# AISC CLUB RACING NORM WENTWORTH



Our second race of the 2023 season was held on Saturday February 18th. It was a beautiful sunny day, but cold and blustery, with temperatures in the mid 50s and winds averaging 18mph with gusts into the low 20s. Six boats came out to the start/finish on the Amelia River in front of the Dee Dee Bartels Boat Ramp, but only five sailed the race. "Lola," which won last month's "Ice Bucket Challenge" race, suffered a mechanical failure prior to the start which precluded her from racing. A strong outgoing tide during the entirety of the race pushed "Misty" across the start line early, so she had to circle back behind the line and start behind the fleet. Unabashed, "Misty" powered her way around the 7.3 mile course and crossed the finish line in 3rd place, but won the race on corrected time.

With each leg of the triangular course in Cumberland Sound being about a half mile long, the four laps of the triangle kept the boats close and the crews busy tacking and beating to the windward mark, reaching on the second leg, and jibing onto the third leg of the triangle. The strong outgoing tide challenged the navigational skills of the skippers to sail into the current and use it to get their boats to the next mark as quickly as possible. All five boats finished the course within eight and half minutes of each other, with Justin Pelham-Webb's "Valkyrie" taking line honors crossing the finish line in one hour and 22 minutes. After applying PHRF handicap time allowances, all boats finished the race with just under three minutes separating the winning boat from the last place boat. An exciting day of very close, competitive racing.
