If any year in our lifetime deserves an asterisk it is 2020. And here is hoping and praying that we will not need one for 2021.

As we close in on the end of pandemic dominated 2020* the club did accomplish somethings for which we are grateful.

- AISC was able to enjoy several club events including the Oyster Roast at KAC, Swim with the Manatees at Crystal River, Scalloping in Steinhattchee, Cajun Cook-off at Tiger Point, Float Trips on the Ichetucknee and Picnic on Talbot Island.
- We also had 5 races off Fort Clinch in addition to the Ocean Challenge race with Golden Isles.

- We continued our water sampling and analysis for the River Keepers pretty much every month.
- AISC held 2 routine club meetings at KAC and 2 somewhat at Tiger Point. March was the
 last routine meeting. Our meetings have been compromised greatly by Corvid and we are
 hopeful that we can get back to a normal schedule in 2021 beginning with a February 2nd
 scheduled members meeting. We will see!
- Unfortunately we had to delay our 2020* Christmas Party. But we are looking forward to an evening in 2021 when we can get together and celebrate.
- We were able to have an indoor / outdoor Thanksgiving Gathering at KAC and share an
 individually boxed meal provided by the club through Kitchen 251. About 50 people
 participated and it was great to be back at KAC. We also collected \$373 in cash
 donations for Joy to the Children. Thanks to Landside for their help in putting this together
 and thanks to Richard and Carol Nieberline for transporting the food to KAC.
- Early in 2020* Bob Canon and Steve Ritter initiated an effort to document AISC history for placement on our website and sharing through Scuttlebutt. Bob reports significant progress into the research of our clubs' founding and growth from 1976 until the present. By contacting many former and current members we located two boxes of paperwork that a former member had stored that included a Scrap Book with articles and photos from the clubs' founding and yearly reports and Scuttlebutts up until the year 2006. From that date the records were no longer as accurately maintained. The records were not well organized, so they were filed into folders by year, all superfluous items sorted though and a list of all past Commodores compiled in chronological order. There are quite a bit of interesting race and cruise reports, newsletters, and articles pertaining to quite a colorful and unique cast of members who have enjoyed our fellowship though the years. We intend to share these stories periodically in the Scuttlebutt. We thank the following past and current members who provided clues and input during the investigative process; Bill Bass, Joe Blanchard, Gail Kellum, Eric Hughes, John Lohr, Tom Maguire, Graeme Nichol, Charlie Monroe, Kent McKee, Russ Ridley, Steve Ritter, and others.

Near term we have a number of events planned to bid farewell to 2020* and to welcome in 2021.

- We will have an informal indoor-outdoor gathering at the KAC bar on the evening of December 8th to celebrate the holidays. We will continue our collections of donations to Joy to the Children to be added to what was collected at the Thanksgiving Gathering. This is NOT a meeting but rather a get together for a drink or two for those interested and comfortable. No registration is needed. We ask you to follow COVID19 guidelines in effect on December 8th. No one who is ill or concerned should attend. There will be no Landside support or food provided. Individuals may bring snacks or munchies as desired but there will be no provision for sharing. We encourage all members to purchase their drinks at the KAC bar and no alcoholic drinks not purchased at the KAC bar may be consumed at this event.
- We are tentatively planning another informal indoor-outdoor gathering at the KAC bar on the evening of January 5th to launch the New Year. Details will be provided by mid-December. Our first formal club meeting is currently scheduled for February 2nd.
- We are planning a final 2020 race for either December 12th or 19th. Details are forthcoming.
- Water sampling and analysis is planned for the first Wednesday in December.

The AISC Board met on November 11th to discuss 2021 Officers and Dues. In early December we will survey the membership for their acknowledgement and concurrence on the following direction.

Officers:

The current officers, board, committee leaders shall continue for 2021 with the following exceptions and acknowledgements.

- The term shall be 2021 or until such time as a new election is held in 2021 covering the 2022 term and any balance of the 2021 term then in effect.
- It is acknowledged that Vice-Commodore Peter Kurtius will be unavailable from April 2021 through the end of the year.
- It is acknowledged that Commodore Tom Durel will be unavailable in February and September through November 2021.
- Vice-Commodore Gary Sanders will assume AISC leadership during the absences of the Commodore and other Vice-Commodore.
- Race committee shall remain as is
- Ken Ernst will continue over Membership
- Julie Veilleux will be stepping aside as the leader of Landside but will remain a member of Landside. We expect to announce a new leader by the New Year.
- o John Kropa will continue as Quartermaster
- o Tom Maguire will continue as Scuttlebut editor and handling newspaper articles.

2021 Dues:

- We expect to end 2020* with about \$5500. This is about \$2500 more than we would normally have.
- While we have postponed this year's Christmas Party, we will have a party sometime in 2021 when the situation is agreeable. This is consistent with the feedback from the majority of the members.
- We will leave dues as is at an annual rate of \$100 and second half of year at \$50 for all membership types of Individual, Family and Joint. This is consistent with the feedback from the majority of the members.

Don't Get Trapped Like a Crab.

I suspect there were plenty of "sailor" words and phrases hurled at a few innocent crab traps during last weekend's race. To keep our reporting fair and balanced, I thought someone should speak about them in a more positive tone. This is easier for me to do because I have yet to catch one with my boat!

The commercial crabbing fishery in Fernandina has always been the little sibling to the larger and more famous shrimping industry. However, at one time there was a successful crab processing plant located on the river front sourcing live crabs from numerous local commercial crabbers. Significant tonnage of canned meat was shipped all over the US including some that was magically converted into "Maryland Crab Cakes". Today, commercial fisherman can purchase a license and crab endorsement for \$225 and then pay \$0.50/tag for each trap. Depending on the license type, a "crabber" can fish up to 600 inshore traps. Recreational crabbers only need a saltwater fishing license and to register their traps online. You can harvest 10 gallons per day and can have up to 5 traps per person.

Blue crabs can be caught year around with spring and summer being slightly better. The more cherished Stone Crabs have a fall and winter season and require a separate license. There are no assigned territories so each crabber will use a specific color or markings on their floats to identify their traps. Trap wars have occurred in the past between commercial crabbers fighting for premium spots.

Crabbers move their traps regularly, chasing more productive locations by varying bottom types and depths. This can move them closer to higher traffic areas, but by regulation cannot be placed in "navigational channels". Another issue is caused by our strong currents that will sometime drag one into areas you are not expecting. Regulations also require that the spherical floats need to be at least 6 inches in diameter and should have a "Color, Hue and Brilliancy" to be easily identified. That just means that if you happen to

see it just before you run over it, you can be sure that it is a crap trap that has you dead in the water.

As I said, I have been lucky enough not to catch one yet. However, I am certain that it will come one day. I will try to find some more experienced sailors to teach me the best techniques for untangling traps from a keel or prop. Maybe that will be my next month's report.


